Starting September 28th at the 9 a.m. Mass we will begin the program, "**Breaking of the Word for Children**", which has been approved by Rome and the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops. The young children (age 5 up to the reception of First Communion) are invited to be a part of this. They would be dismissed after the first prayer of Mass and returned back to their parents after the Creed. They will have the readings, etc. brought down to their level. There are 4 volunteers who will be working with the children, 2 catechists and 2 aides, alternating every other week. This does not exempt the 1st and 2nd graders from attending Religious Education Classes. The upcoming dates are: 9/28, 10/5, 10/12, 10/19, 10/26, 11/2, 11/9, 11/16, 11/23. Jesus said "Let the children come to me" and we are trying to live those words.

Pope Benedict highly recommends that people prayerfully read the scriptures and pray on how they affect their lives. The scripture that we use in regular liturgies on Sunday do not cover the whole bible. Each week you are given the readings for the next week and that might be a way to look at the readings a head of time for you and your family. For those who may not have a bible, The New American Bible (Catholic version) and the Jerusalem Bible are good and approved texts. If you have never read the bible, I strongly suggest you start with the gospels and the New Testament before you go through the Old Testament. If you don't have a bible, I suggest you buy one of the above.

There are a number of commentaries which take the scripture passages and explain more fully some of the scripture sections which may not be clear when you are reading them. Recommended for these commentaries are: New Collegeville Bible Commentary, which can be purchased from Liturgical Press @ www.litpress.org and another series of commentaries are located at http://liturgy.slu.edu/ (which are free). If you choose another commentary I would suggest that you make sure it is a Catholic commentary.

As St. Paul reminds us, "we cannot worship an unknown God". As a follower of Jesus it is very good that we look over the message that God has given to us in the Holy Scriptures as a source of getting to know God more fully.

Vocations – In today's first reading, the Lord reminds us through the prophet Isaiah "my thoughts are not your thoughts, nor are your ways my ways." One of the hallmarks of Christian growth is realizing that God's plan for me might be different from what I'd like to choose as a career. Sorting it all out involves discernment, and that's never easy to do by oneself.
